Dear Friends and Colleagues

I would like to begin this week's bulletin by expressing deepest sympathy to the family, friends and colleagues of Sir David Amess MP who was tragically killed during his constituency surgery on Friday. I heard the Archbishop of York pay tribute to Sir David, saying he knew him well as a MP and as a friend. The Archbishop recalled he was a man of Christian faith and was deeply committed to serving his community as a MP for nearly forty years. He worked across political divides to support vulnerable people and was particularly active in supporting homeless charities. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family and community.

It was lovely to see lots of governors at the network meeting last Wednesday evening and it was great that many heads came together for our very first head teacher briefing last week. Thank you for the wonderful feedback we received for these events. I was conscious however, that my team and I were providing you with lots of updates and you may have thought, 'I need to act upon that,' and 'I need to follow that up'. Please remember, as members of a supportive church school family, we can help each other — it doesn't hurt to ask!

In schools, there is always another job, always something else to do. Everyone is working hard and it is physically and mentally exhausting. With one week left before we reach the end of the half term, we may be thinking, 'what else needs to be done by Friday?'

I talked with a number of school leaders at a conference on Friday and asked, 'How are you?' One leader responded with 'tired'. Another leader said, 'It's been a long hard term and I'm ready for a rest.'

Relaxation and rest are key in supporting our own wellbeing and mental health. Mark Black, an inspirational speaker states, 'Sometimes the most productive thing you can do is relax'.

It's so easy within hectic lifestyles, work pressure and deadlines to forget to relax. In education, we tend to wait for a half term break before we relax. We need however, to try and build times of rest in our busy work schedules.

At the conference on Friday, which was hosted by LAAT (and was great, by the way!), I sat with school leaders and enjoyed a wonderful lunch. A head teacher told me it was the first time he had sat down to eat lunch on a school day for a very long time. I know the pressures in all schools but that can't be healthy. We need time to step away, even if it is just for a few minutes. Giving our mind and body a break gives us greater energy levels to tackle whatever life throws at us.

It's worth remembering that, according to the story of creation in Genesis 1, even God knows when to take a rest ('Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all the work of creating that he had done') – if God sees the importance of rest, then so, too, must we. Jesus knew the importance of rest as well. In the Bible verse at the beginning of this bulletin, the first three words are 'Come to me'. In life we so often try to do things in our own strength but this is an open invite for us to come to him.

From the verse, we imagine two oxen yoked together to pull a cart or plow a field. A yoke is how to shoulder a load. Jesus invites us to take up his easy yolk, to navigate life's burdens and difficulties with him by your side – to shoulder the weight.

I hope that you have a restful half term when it arrives. I pray that you have time to unwind and lighten the load – time to enjoy hobbies, time for family and friends and time to relax!

Questions to reflect on:

- How do you build rest and relaxation into your day?
- Do you find relaxation productive?
- How do you feel about Jesus' invitation to 'Come to me'?



The Youth Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) courses are for anyone who works with, lives with or supports young people aged 8-18. We train the adults in a young person's life to have the skills and confidence to step in, offer first aid and guide them towards the support they need. In doing so, they can speed up a young person's recovery, stop issues from developing into a crisis, and ultimately save lives.

Ofsted: RE, Locally Agreed Syllabus and Curriculum

Last week we mentioned that there was some confusion about the role of the locally agreed syllabus for RE in constructing an effective RE curriculum. The Diocesan RE Adviser clarified that a syllabus is not a curriculum: the syllabus sets down the 'what' and the curriculum should articulate the 'how' and the 'why' in relation to the school's particular context. We also mentioned that we would seek further clarification from the Ofsted RE lead, Dr Richard Kueh.

Dr Kueh has concurred with the explanation provided in last week's bulletin, referring to the excerpt below from the recently published Ofsted RE Research Review (2021):

The EIF considers the extent to which leaders of the curriculum adopt or construct a curriculum that is ambitious and designed to give learners the knowledge they need to succeed in life. As outlined previously, the extent to which school subject leaders are freely able to choose the content of their RE curriculums depends on the type of school and, where appropriate, its funding agreement.

Many academies have greater degrees of freedom about what to include within their RE curriculums. Schools that follow a locally agreed syllabus will use this as a basis for what pupils are taught. [footnote 32] Typically, the content of this syllabus prescribes high-level outcomes that subject leaders go on to use as they design their school-specific RE curriculum. This contextualisation process is similar to the ways that schools may take high-level outcomes from the national curriculum in other subjects and use them to construct their school-specific subject curriculum. Non-statutory guidance might accompany an agreed syllabus to assist subject leaders in constructing their school RE curriculum.

However, to be clear: it is the enacted RE curriculum, in the context of the school, which is taught to and experienced by pupils, that is considered within the quality of education judgement. The contextualised school RE curriculum is also the focus of this research review.
