24 The disciples went and woke him, saying, "Master, Master, we're going to drown!" He got up and rebuked the wind and the raging waters; the storm subsided, and all was calm. Luke 8:24

Dear Friends and Colleagues,

I hope you have had a safe and restful half term break. With storms Dudley and Eunice battering the UK over the past few days, it has been a disruptive and indeed quite a frightening time. We have seen record breaking winds of 122 mph on the Isle of



Wight and the first ever red weather warning over London with winds capable of sadly causing a loss of life. Nearer to home, the storm caused trees to topple, power cuts, transport links to close and some damage to property.

I guess for many families during half term when the weather was so bad, it will have been a time to stay at home, maybe watch a film, read a book or play a board game. I hope you as school leaders found this time to relax with friends and family.

Thankfully, the storms have now subsided and we are able to safely venture outdoors again.

Reflecting on the Bible passage above, we think about the story of Jesus calming the storm told in the three Gospels, Matthew, Mark and Luke, and what this story may mean to us.

Jesus had been teaching near the Sea of Galilee. Afterwards, He wanted a respite from the crowds so decided to take a boat with the apostles to the opposite shore where there were no large towns (Mark 4:35–36). The Bible reports not long after they sailed, Jesus fell asleep and a storm arose (Luke 8:23).

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An important point in the Bible story is that Jesus needed time to rest. We all need time to rest and recharge our batteries. As you start this new half term, I hope that you feel refreshed and ready to approach new opportunities and challenges with vigour.

Another point in the story to reflect upon is that as Jesus was asleep in the boat, the experienced fishermen he was with were frightened they were not going to survive the storm.

"The waves were breaking into the boat, so that the boat was already filling. But [Jesus] was in the stern, asleep on the cushion" (Mark 4:37–38).

The fishermen lacked faith in themselves, each other and in God. When Jesus awoke and calmed the storm, he rebuked them for their lack of faith (Mark 4:40).

As school leaders, we will have experienced storms in the educational landscape. There may even be some on the horizon. You may be looking out with your binoculars to see what budget pressures are ahead or what future government policy may bring. Like weather forecasters, though, we can never be totally accurate in judging the severity of the storm or even if they will hit our school communities at all. Will it be a gale force wind or a light breeze? Will our school community be at the epicentre of the storm or will the storm miss us completely?

Whatever lies ahead, we must have confidence in our own resilience, strength and creativity to convert the energy of the storm into something good for our community. We could simply batten down the hatches, pick up the pieces and let the storm pass until the next one. Alternatively, we can look more positively, metaphorically construct a wind turbine and capture the high winds to help the school community drive forward.

At our forthcoming conference for headteachers, senior leaders and clergy, we will focus on the theme, 'Leading with Optimism'. Keynote presentations and workshops at this event will help us to think about how we as a church school family can work collaboratively, and convert challenges into opportunities to enable all adults and pupils to flourish.
