

May 15th is International Day of Families. The above quote is from Advices and Queries - the bare bones of Quakerism, in written form - recognising the fundamental importance of biological and found family.

It can be hard to remember this, when self-doubt and lack of self-confidence attack us - our gifts are then often better seen by colleagues, friends, and family. My grandfather was a headteacher of primary schools, he was gifted in drawing out pupils' potential I, encouraging their aspirations. His was a deep Christian faith, where the Kingdom of God could be seen and made by all.

The uniqueness of our gifts is beautiful, an outworking of what we have been given by God.

SIAMS 2023-24—Schools likely to be inspected

The National SIAMS teams has just published the list of schools that are *likely* to have a SIAMS inspection in the next academic year 2023 to 2024.

The list can be found <u>here</u>. On that, you will see that there are many church schools in our diocese to be inspected next year.

Please note this list does not guarantee that a school will be inspected but it is likely that it will be.

You will be aware that a revised SIAMS framework comes into operation from September 2023. It is important that all schools are familiar with the framework and its expectations. The diocesan education team offers lots of support and training on SIAMS for staff and governors. Please see our website at https://www.lincolndiocesaneducation.com/siams

If a school has not yet joined the diocesan service level agreement (SLA) for next year, please can I encourage you to do so, so that we are able to provide the best and most cost effective training and support for the school.

Please note that the current SIAMS list for 2022-2023 remains unchanged and so it is still *likely but not guaranteed* that a school will be inspected before the summer if your school is on that list. That list is also on our website.

Since the pandemic and the onset of the cost of living crisis many families are under huge financial pressure. Bishop Nicholas is cycling 407 miles to raise money for the Bishop of Lincoln's Ready for School Fund.

The Fund aims to support schoolchildren who are lacking the things they need in order confidently to access the full life of school and the curriculum. Grants are given to meet some of the identified needs of individual pupils. Items such as school uniform, PE Kit, maths equipment

and lunchboxes are just some examples of where the fund can be put to work.

407 miles isn't a random distance! It will allow him to complete his two-wheeled visits to every

mainland Anglican cathedral in England, Scotland and Wales - a bicycle journey that he began when he was a parish priest and that he hopes to end in Inverness on Sunday 14th May 2023. It is his way of saying 'thank you', also, to everyone who kindly supported him following his surgery last autumn.
